Acolytes: An Important Role in Worship

This weekend we recognize more than 40 young people who have been serving over the past year as Truro acolytes during Sunday worship services, weddings and funerals and special services during Christmas, Lent and Easter. Their faithful service—carrying the cross and torches in the processions and recessions, lighting and extinguishing the candles, helping with the offering and assisting the priests during communion—helps all of us enter more deeply into worship together.

We have eight acolyte teams, four for each of the two services in the sanctuary. Each group is led by a crucifer—an experienced acolyte chosen for leadership gifts and a servant heart. Including two torch bearers who carry the candles and two or three additional acolytes who help with lighting altar candles and setting the communion table, each team serves every four weeks. This year, we have four seniors who will complete their service as acolytes and move into the next phase of their lives.

Another critical role in Truro's acolyte program is the parent coordinator. These parents sit with the acolytes each week and assist them during communion. We will be looking for additional

parents to fill these roles for next year as several of our current coordinators are also completing their season of service.

Our acolytes will be sitting together in the front at each service this Sunday and then celebrating with their families at a barbeque on the front lawn after the 11:15 service. As you see them, please let them know how much you appreciate their participation in our worship.

Serving God, Gaining Greater Understanding of Liturgy *by Grace Purnell*

I remember the first Sunday I donned an acolyte robe: it felt huge, unnatural, a fitting cover for a girl trying to make sense of the instructions which seemed so numerous and complicated. Bewildered, I did the jobs assigned to me one by one; being careful even of the breaths I took, in order to assure that I would not make a mistake in front of so many people. That is all I remember of that first time.

The six years since have passed in one fluid memory of chalices and purificators being held in front of the sanctuary, of frantic moments in the sacristy, and of walking through the double doors into the sanctuary only to assume a feigned peace, which became real after only a moment.

I found, after several years, that my robe, once so foreign, now felt comfortable and familiar. My place during communion on the steps of the altar was one I looked forward to

assuming—no longer did I hide from the stares of the congregation, rather, in a confidence inspired by hundreds of services in the same position, I found a fulfillment in carrying out the duties assigned to me. As the years passed, I found my knowledge of the intricacies involved in carrying out a service expanding. No longer did all of my little jobs during the service seem complicated and confusing—as I understood their placement and the correct way to perform them, I began to understand the liturgical significance of each and every small piece that fit together every Sunday to create a rich and multi-layered order.

In all of these things I learned, from the downright practical—bending the wick before lighting a candle, to assure that it lights the first try—to the finer points of liturgy and symbol in each and every part of the service, I began to relish the opportunity to serve my Creator in this way. The understanding I have gained in the

past six years has increased my appreciation for the church—both as an institution, in all of its shapes and forms, and also as a symbolic representation of the life of our Lord. In quiet moments, robing up before the service, standing, breathless, with the honor of carrying the cross of my Lord, holding his very blood in my hands as I stand before his faithful: I have come to know the structure that orders our devotion, and in knowledge, learned to love the Anglican form of worship, and the God whom it honors. The next Sundays, my last as a Truro acolyte, I remember those Sundays when I was just beginning. I remember the wisdom I have gained in these six years. As I carry the cross in front of the congregation for my last time, I thank God for the opportunity to represent him to the church, and for the ways He has revealed himself to me through my years as an acolyte.

A Call to Truro to Pray & Fast

Please join us as we come together as a church family and commit to pray and fast on Thursdays May 19th–June 10th as the Commonwealth of Virginia Supreme Court deliberates the Episcopal Church appeal of our case. We expect we may have a ruling from the Supreme Court on Friday, June 11th (although this is subject to change). You are encouraged, as you are able, to fast at least one meal every Thursday and intercede in prayer. To help guide your prayers, here is a prayer that I will be using in my prayer time:

O Lord Jesus Christ, who built your Church upon the rock of the Apostles, that even the gates of hell cannot prevail against it: Be merciful to the churches of this land, give us the grace of repentance so that our hearts turn to you alone, and especially we pray for our own Church, Truro Parish, that we would have a single heart for You. Make our worship pleasing to your sight, sweeten our fellowship with tender hearts toward one another, unite us in a common vision and purpose, grant us favor in the deliberations of the Virginia Supreme Court, and most of all, make us instruments of your peace and truth in a country in need of a revival of goodness and light. We ask this in Jesus Name. Amen.

If you are new to fasting, an excellent resource to introduce you to this Christian discipline of prayer is Richard Foster's *Celebration of Discipline*, available at Amazon.com or at your local Christian bookstore. Now is the time to pray!

Once again, we have justifiable confidence in a favorable ruling by the Court. Beyond that, we are supremely confident that no matter the outcome, this church is greatly blessed by our Lord, and we will continue to advance strongly in our vision and ministry.
